On Thursdays while we wait for the stocking truck to arrive little groups form and then melt into new groups and the conversations skip from topic to topic. Talk is of past trips, dogs, plans for the summer, grouse hunting, what bird just passed overhead, outdoors equipment and, of course, fishing. But from time to time someone will mention that they have seen people fishing during closed hours, that people were seen with stringers that held more fish than allowed or that a person with one or two fish on a stringer had already put six or eight into the trunk of a car.

Even though they are infuriated by violations of fishing regulations, many people find it difficult to approach those who seem to be breaking the law - possibly because of a natural shyness or possibly because of a fear of retaliation. But if violations are observed something must be done.

An easy way to report violations is to call the Conservations Officers from the DEP's Northern Region Office (Bergen, Essex, Hudson, Hunterdon, Morris, Passaic, Somerset, Sussex, Union, Warren Counties) at 908-735-8240

However, an efficient and sometimes profitable way of handling such situations is through Operation Game Thief. This program, sponsored by the New Jersey State Federation of Sportsmen's Clubs in close cooperation with the Division of Fish and Wildlife, seeks to enlist the help of all

A Sea Of Bottles

Some times I do things with my brain on autopilot and it is not until I get wacked by some bit of otherwise obvious information that I come to my senses. This was the case recently when the President of the New York State TU council addressed the participants of a Casting for Recovery retreat.

He spoke about the current battle to stop Nestle from building water bottling plants, one in Tug Hill and two at the headwaters of Catskill streams. We all know that when you draw millions of gallons of water per day from an aquifer it has an adverse effect on ground water and thus an adverse effect on stream flows. Of course, I was sitting there knowing that I had about 6 bottles of water in my cooler.

Here is the big picture. Every gallon of water put into plastic bottles is one less gallon for the fish. Plastic bottles are made from petrochemicals which is another use of oil. Once empty the bottles are a disposal problem. Because we have no bottle bill in New Jersey they may get recycled or else they go to the landfill where they will remain for hundreds of years. Fuel

oil used to transport the water by truck to the stores hits us again. And of course the coal, oil or natural gas used to generate the electricity to run



the pumps hurts us by consuming fuel and polluting the air. So as convenient as they may be it is time for me (and you) to stop or at least re-

duce purchases of bottled water.

You might also consider a letter to NY DEC voicing opposition to the pumping plants. If these companies have to use our water sources, why not focus on the outflow of a watershed rather than its source. Great Bear bottles water from wells in Teterboro. It has to be filtered and purified but they are drawing it before it gets to the ocean. I think that makes more sense than taking water from the sources of our often abused trout streams.

So go out and buy yourself a reusable water bottle, fill it at home and save some fish.

What do You Think?

New Jersey has a number of streams on which some sections are designated as Trout Conservation Areas (TCAs). Some are year-round, some are seasonal, and then there are the fly -fishing only TCAs.

All of these TCAs require that only artificial lures be used (some require that only dry flies, wet flies, bucktails, nymphs and streamers be used), all prohibit the use or possession of live or preserved bait and any substance that contains a concentration of bait scent, and most are designated as catch and release only. The applicable dates of the seasonal TCAs, the specific restrictions on each of the areas



and the descriptions of the locations of the areas are listed

on page 19 of New Jersey's Freshwater Fish and Wildlife Digest – the free pamphlet that sets forth all of the freshwater fishing regulations.

The DEP's Bureau of Freshwater Fisheries would like to know what you think about the TCA regulations. Trout Unlimited's State Council will collect TU members' thoughts about the TCAs when the Council meets in July so, if you would like to be heard, send your opinions to Riffles or to Bruce Seiden who is Vice President of the State Council.

Free Fishing Days

If you would like to take someone fishing for their first time the first weekend in June will be the time to do it. Saturday and Sunday, June 5 and 6 are New Jersey's annual Free Freshwater Fishing Days.

On June 5 and 6 residents and nonresidents may fish in New Jersey's public fresh waters without a license or a trout stamp. All other regulations, including size and daily catch limits remain in effect.

Freshwater Licenses

Resident: Age 16 to 69 and must have lived in New Jersey for six months immediately prior to the time of application.

Active Duty Servicemen and Women: A person who is on active duty in the armed services of the United States is entitled to fish with a resident license.

N.J. National Guard Members: NJ National Guard personnel are entitled to free licenses, permits and stamps.

Veterans with Service-Connected Disability: Resident NJ veterans with service-connected disability are eligible for free licenses.

Licenses for the Blind: Residents with total blindness may obtain free fishing licenses.
