

### President's Beat

On behalf of The Board of Directors, I would like to wish all of our members a happy and healthy New Year. The beginning of each calendar year brings new hopes and expectations, both large and small.

On the National scale, I hope that the EPA can find means to cure the "vapors" which seem to be infecting the Beltway. There are some very strange rulings coming from our governmental agencies in recent months. One example is the recent ruling by the administration that hatchery fish may be counted along with wild fish when considering listing as endangered species. This is evident in the revisions of regulations concerning stocks of Pacific salmon. Presently only one in five west-coast salmon is now spawned in the wild. Contradicting 15 years of Pacific Northwest salmon recovery efforts, a 2001 federal court ruled that there are errors in the listing of Coho salmon, because the numbers were based solely on wild fish, disregarding the numbers of hatchery stocks. The final policy on this will be published soon in the Federal Registry (and opened for public comment).

Jeff Miller, Bay Area Wildlands Coordinator of the Center for Biological Diversity, was quoted as saying, "Hatchery fish and wild fish are very different in behavior and genetic variability. No credible scientist would support the idea of counting large numbers of hatchery fish, which are produced artificially in concrete rearing tanks, and then dumped in the estuaries, bays and lower rivers, when assessing wild fish stocks. Hatchery fish, which are mass-produced and have low genetic variability, lower the ability of wild fish runs to adapt to environmental change." This is clearly a case of the Administration ignoring the reports of

You can get one for New Jersey or Pennsylvania at most sporting goods stores (Ramsey Outdoors is warm and has good browsing material) or via the Internet. Don't forget that you may be eligible for special consideration when applying for a New Jersey license. As Don Sirota pointed out last year in Riffles, NJ's Disabled Veterans are entitled to free fishing licenses. If you're 70 or older, fishing on a farm, or if you're blind you can also forget about a license in New Jersey; check the NJ DEP's web site for full information.

Other issues facing reconsideration include the relaxation of the heavy metals standards, logging in Sequoia forests, a deregulation of pesticides and power industry standards, and the deregulation of mercury emissions. At the last website, please be sure to read the article by James C. Aker, "The Weakening Protection of the Environment Raises Alarms: A Personal Perspective", in the Fall 2004 issue of Gordon's Quill Vol. XVII, No. 6. This is a succinct and well-written digest of the current Washington initiatives.

Once again, I urge all of our members to keep informed and continue to ask questions of our representatives and demand sound science-based answers. Let's make sure they represent us and environmental improvement rather than the larger, more powerful industries that lobby to benefit from these rulings.

### Winter Fishing

This is the time of year when some adjustments in you standard equipment should be considered.

That reel with the extra smooth cork or teflon drag system that worked so well in

warm weather will not tolerate a dunking at below freezing temperatures. Better to use the old click and pawl reel rather than risk damaging the drag system on your expensive new reel.

Also check your footgear. Felt bottoms become ice skates after they're wet and you then walk along a snow covered stream bank. Unless they have aggressive studs you're better off with rubber bottoms. Better yet strap on the korkers

# Wishing everyone a Happy New Year!

This is the time of year when we can make plans for the future, with New Year's resolutions to make 2005 the best year yet! At the same time, it's also a time to look back and savor the memories of past years. Remember the time that you caught your first fish? How about when you waded too deep and got a boot full of ice cold water, or the time that you caught that lunker Bass or the five pound trout? Perhaps it was that trip of a lifetime that you took or the time you taught your son or daughter to cast a fly. All precious memories! Over the years EJTU has worked primarily on improving fishing on the Ramapo and we have received many compliments from county and state officials for our work. We intend to continue our work on the Ramapo in coming years to make it all that it can be.

There is another River in our area that at one time was considered one of the premier fly fishing streams in the state. In the 1950's the Wortendyke Field and Stream Club used to go to the stream every spring and clear any downed trees so a stocking boat could get through. Yes, the state float stocked many streams in those days. I always remember catching my first fish there, a bluegill when I was six years old. The stream is the Upper Hackensack. It runs from Old Tappan Reservoir in Old Tappan to the Oradell Reservoir. The best section remaining is about a mile of fishable water that runs downstream from Old Tappan Road at the Revolutionary War Baylor Massacre site. There is parking available on Old Tappan Road. The water flow is controlled by United Water Company because the river is between two reservoirs and during the summer there are times when the river might be low, depending on how they release the flow. All in all this is still a beautiful stream that might be worth a visit.

The Saddle River is also a stream that you might find interesting, as there is a nature path that runs from Linwood Avenue in Ridgewood, through the Duck Pond Park then south to the Dunkerhook Park on Paramus Road in Paramus. Trout are stocked at these points and might be worth a visit some evening. There are picnic tables at both parks and a family cookout could be included.

Do you still have mercury thermometers? The Bergen County Utilities Authority will swap a new digital thermometer for your mercury one for free, while supplies last, thanks to a partnership with BD (Becton Dickinson and company).
