# President's Beat

It seems that we went from Winter to Summer and then rebounded to Spring within a few weeks. Whatever happened, it's evident that winter was pushed into history. The days continue to lengthen, buds are swelling and green leaves are bursting through to sunlight, and, although temperatures can still be on the cool side, staying outside no longer need be painful. And, of course trout season is upon us.

EJTU helped stock the Ramapo on the Tuesday before opening day, an event about which the Record ran a front page story on the following Friday, April 4. The story featured a photo of our intrepid boat crew flinging a net full of trout into the water and also included some nice publicity for our chapter. We will continue to work with the Department of Fish and Wildlife as they stock the Ramapo on Thursday mornings through mid-May so if you have free time on a Thursday morning you should try to come out to the areas where we meet. We usually have a few people meet the truck first in Oakland where Britt's tackle shop was located and then everyone assembles on the west side of the bridge over the river at Glen Gray Road on the Oakland/Mahwah border. When the truck makes its way to this location we fill a cooler with fish that are to be distributed upstream from the bridge and we also fill the floating box that is towed behind the "good ship Seiden" as it makes its way downstream to Navajo Way. Another part of our group then drives upstream to Halifax Road where they again meet the truck and distribute fish in that section of the river. Make a note on your calendar to be at the bridge at Glen Gray Road on Thursdays at around 9:30 AM; you will enjoy yourself and you will get a chance to tell your fishing stories as we wait for the truck from the hatchery.

What happens in May? Some people will go into a field and prance around a large pole, Douglas Adams fans will celebrate Towel Day, there will be a Sunday of traffic jams in honor of Mothers, and on Memorial Day the country will remember the men and women who have died in military service to their country.

But, another notable event will take place. Doug Penna will move the EJTU display to the West Caldwell library.

## **Fishing Licenses**

Opening day of trout season is here and there may be a few people who have not yet purchased their fishing licenses. Moreover, there may still be some people who have always purchased their licenses from a sporting goods store and, as a result, are not familiar with New Jersey's on-line system of issuing hunting, fishing and trapping licenses.

New Jersey's Integrated Electronic Licensing System (IELS) identifies customers by a lifetime Conservation Identification Number (CID#) that is used on all licenses and permits, so the first time you visit the license Web site you will be asked for identifying information to establish a record and CID#. However, if you already have a CID#, enter it and all of your needed personal information will be retrieved immediately. Then you simply choose the licenses(s) and stamps that you wish to purchase and submit your payment. The license may then be printed on your home printer.

The on-line system is easy to use and most licenses can be printed at home (hunting

licenses cannot be printed immediately but are mailed to the applicant) as soon as you have entered all of the necessary information and paid the required fees. If you are concerned about putting your name, address, and



other personal data on-line, you will find that the information that you give to the local sporting goods store will be transferred to the same NJ State computers that are used in the on-line system.

To access the system go to the NJ Division of Fish and Wildlife's web site, http://www.state.nj.us/dep/fgw/ and click on the Licenses and Permits button on the left side. This will bring you to a page that explains all of the available licenses. Next click on the "2008 Licenses Now Available!" link near the top of the page and you will be led through the licensing process.

# **Trout in the Classroom**

Trout in the Classroom (TIC) has been operating in New Jersey for quite a while but, even though EJTU sponsors an installation at the Pequannock Valley Middle School and occasionally asks for volunteers who can deliver trout eggs to schools, some EJTU members may not be fully aware of what the program does.

Trout in the Classroom is an innovative, hands-on conservation education curriculum serving grade-school, middle and high school students throughout the United States. Through the experience of raising trout from eggs, students learn the importance of clean natural water resources, streambank ecology, and various modes of scientific inquiry. In New Jersey, TIC is a cooperative effort of the NJ Division of Fish & Wildlife and the New Jersey State Council of Trout Unlimited, along with its member chapters who sponsor fish tanks and equipment in local schools.

The New Jersey program came about in 1991 when a teacher in the Hopatcong Middle School worked with the Fred

Burroughs North Jersey chapter of TU to raise brook trout from eggs. Those same students, dubbed "the Brook Trout Bunch", successfully petitioned the state to have the brook trout listed as the state fish. The brook trout (salvelinus fontinalis) - actually not a true trout, but a char and member of the salmon family - is the only "trout" that is native to our state.

The current curriculum is aimed at science classes for grades 6 - 9 although there are grades both above and below these. Consideration is being given to developing a second curriculum aimed at the elementary school grades due to the interest for programs at those levels

the interest for programs at those levels. The curriculum is uniquely developed for students in New Jersey and borrows heavily from the New York state curriculum where more than 150 schools participate each year, including many in New York City.

The brook trout thrives in clean, cold water, and nowhere in the country is clean water at a higher premium than here in New Jersey where human encroachment has had such a tremendous impact. If you think of the brook trout and the insects that they feed upon as the proverbial "canary in a coal mine" in relation to clean

# Ramsey Outdoor Coupons

# NJ Boat Ramp Guide

If you are a boater who likes to fish the Delaware River or New Jersey's Atlantic Coast you will be interested in the New Jersey Boater's Ramp Guide that was published by njboatramps.org. There are three ways to use the guide.

Go to http://www.state.nj.us/dep/fgw/pdf/ boat\_ramp\_guide.pdf and you can view all sixty-seven pages of the printed guide. The ramps are not in alphabetic order but are listed from north to south, down the Atlantic coast and down the Delaware River. Each ramp's description includes symbols that give information about fees, restrooms, restaurants, fuel, etc. The guide is in pdf format, so if you need a hard copy it can be printed.

Go to <u>www.njboatramps.org</u> you will be brought to a site that provides a satellite view of the entire state on which small red flags designate the locations of ramps. Click on a flag and you will be given the name of the ramp, its location, a contact telephone number, and a brief description of the ramp.

Finally, if you do not want to print a copy of the guide but you would like to have a hard copy, the <u>www.njboatramps.org</u> site has a link (bottom, left) at which you can enter your name and address and the publishers will send a copy to you.

water, you will come to appreciate this most beautiful of our freshwater fishes. In 2006 Trout in the Classroom in New Jersey taught over 4,000 students throughout the state about the need to conserve our coldwater resources. Students in inner cities will join those in the more rural areas of our state in raising and, ultimately, releasing brook trout into local trout holding rivers and streams.

The New Jersey TIC web site, http:// www.njtroutintheclassroom.org/, contains detailed information about the program and the schools that participate in it but, for an interesting view of TIC you should visit the "FishCam" installed in Bedwell Elementary School's 150 gallon tank http://tinyurl.com/28w4mj where you can watch young Brookies swim about.
