Ramapo River Day 2003 June 14, 2003

On Saturday, June 14th, EJTU in conjunction with Ramapo College will host Ramapo River Day 2003. This is one of

the most ambitious projects we undertake. We again expect between 150 and 200 students to participate in this program and we need lots of help. This year's program will

be divided into six "stations". We will: (1) collect and sort macroinvertebrates collected from the river (2) identify and supprise them

river, (2) identify and examine them using microscopes, (3) conduct water chemistry tests on water samples obtained from the river, (4) demonstrate and discuss causes of non-point source pollution using models, (5) conduct a

nature walk to identify streamside vegetation, and (6) demonstrate fly tying and teach flycasting. Ramapo College volunteers will oversee the more technical station, and Americorps volunteers will handle the



non-point source pollution demonstration. Our members are needed for the in-river collection, fly tying, fly casting, setup, takedown and general supervision.

In order to accommodate the large number of participants and to ensure that they get the most out of the program, we will have two of each station. We will need about 30 members to properly execute the program.

The Chapter received national recognition last year when TU's Trout magazine wrote about our program. The program

This will be used to continue our conservation and educational programs.



Fly of the Month

It's here - it's here. After a long snowy winter opening day has finally arrived.

The first hatch of the year will usually be the early black stone fly. These tiny (size 18) stones can frequently be seen crawling out of the water onto a snow bank to hatch.

The first mayfly of the year will usually be the tiny (size 22 or 24) blue winged olives.

If you don't have both of these patterns in your fly box, and you plan on hitting the water soon, I would suggest you hit the vise first. While you're at it, how about whipping up an extra dozen for the chapter.

Tie up one of these, or any other pattern, and turn them in at the next meeting. You will receive 10 points and an entry into the monthly drawing for every dozen flies you turn in. More importantly, you will be helping your chapter raise funds for our various projects.

The chapter's fly inventory got wiped clean during the Suffern show and Basil could have sold a lot more if we had them. Now is the time to start rebuilding our inventory for next year. If you can't make the meeting, mail your flies to the chapter P.O. Box or turn them in to any director.

First is the U.S. Sportsmen's Alliance's website at http://www.ussportsmen.org. The mission statement of the U.S. Sportsmen's Alliance, originally called the Wildlife Legislative Fund of America, is to, "protect the rights of hunters, fishermen, trappers and scientific wildlife management professionals."

This website includes features such as latest national and statewide news alerts. It also tracks legislation and court cases in the states, including New Jersey. There are partner links that connect to other outdoor organizations, businesses and state game departments. Go to State reports to find out about the latest proposed legislation in New Jersey and other states affecting sportsmen.

The second website is http:// www.junkscience.com. This unusually named site provides us with different viewpoints on scientific issues of the day. We are constantly being alerted and warned about pollution, mercury poisoning, global warming, environmental affects on fish populations, etc. Sometimes we get one point of view about these issues as if they were "sacred". You will find some different points of view here where some of the most widely accepted environmental issues are debunked.

This website claims that, " 'Junk Science'...is faulty scientific data and analysis used to further a special agenda." Here you will see global warming disputed, for instance. There are a number of free articles as well as publications that can be purchased. This is definitely a website for those concerned with environmental issues.

This site is the website for the New Jersey State Federation of Sportsmen's Clubs. This organization includes sportsmen's clubs from all over New Jersey; including TU chapters, hunting clubs, trapper's organizations, as well as individual members. The organization claims to represent as many as 150,000 sportsmen. The Federation is responsible for nominating members to the Fish and Wildlife Council.

The Federation also publishes an excellent monthly newspaper called the New Jersey Federated Sportsmen News edited by the capable Ron Jacobsen. This newspaper plus personal liability insurance coverage of one million dollars makes Federation membership worthwhile.

The Federation's mission statement is twofold; "to protect sportsmen's interests in the responsible management of New Jersey's fish and wildlife resources; and, to protect fish and wildlife by preserving and enhancing habitat." These goals are addressed on the website by keeping us informed about legislation and developments impacting New Jersey sportsmen. Additionally there are many interesting and useful links on the site.

Stay Dry

Fish Story of the Month

If you've driven down Glen Gray Road you may have noticed a chained dirt road on the right just before the bridge. This road, Drenth's Drive, leads to a secluded and beautiful section of the Ramapo that meanders past brush covered banks and grassy meadows. I often fish here on spring mornings, more often just to escape to this slice of heaven not one mile from my house than to actually catch fish. Having a trout stream in my back yard has a value beyond measure.

One morning last spring I was having terrific luck with my yellow and gold Rooster tail on this section of the river, having caught and released four beautiful Brook trout within the first hour. My luck, however, was short lived. After trying a pinpoint cast into a deep pocket next to a downed tree my lure drifted momentarily then snagged on the end of the stump. After many tugs and gyrations the lure still would not budge and finally a loud snap signaled the separation of line from lure.

Seeing the Rooster tail on the end of that log was too much for me so I waded across to retrieve my treasure. As I approached the stump I found that it was barricaded by thick brush and that my lure could only be reached by wading back out into the water and around to the end that protruded into the stream. I couldn't see the bottom of the riverbed so I took two light steps and was relieved to see the water was fairly shallow.

But, on my third step I lunged downward sharply and would have completely submerged had I not grabbed onto small branches sticking out from the side of the stump! The deep pocket that looked so enticing to cast to was exactly that and I was submerged to the top of my waders with my lure just out of arms reach and my body hanging by a few bent twigs while the current pulled on me.

While the safety of land was now my main concern I would not be turned away from my mission so I grabbed harder at the twigs and branches and shimmied down the stump to my prized booty dangling at its end. I had now placed the value of a gold bar on that \$2.29 lure.

Ramapo Ramblin'

By the time you read this trout season will be just a few days away. I wish everyone a lot of tight lines this year, however, please remember safety first. Tell your wife or friend where you intend to go and approximately when you will return. Take along a fully charged cell phone and if possible a buddy. If you go alone try to remain within shouting distance of other people or at least carry a whistle or something that will attract attention if you get into trouble. I purposely put Mike Petty's fish story in this month to demonstrate what can go wrong and to remind everyone to be careful as the water is usually high, cold and unforgiving in the spring. Bob Papson, from N.J. Fish and Wildlife has received our request to make a 1.2 mile stretch of the Ramapo a conservation area. This would make the stretch catch and release for fly fishing and spin fishing, artificial lures only, and a limit of one trout over 15 inches per day from the last stocking in Spring to the following March closing. Before making the decision he plans to electric shock the section in August to check if trout can survive the summer. We must try to keep as many trout in the river as possible this year.

There is a possibility that the state will run a river bank restoration class along the Ramapo this fall, thanks to the efforts of Bill Borowski.

It appears that the parking lot at Potash Lake off Colfax Avenue will be open this year. A boat launching ramp is in place and Bob Papson told me that they will be stocking the original Ramapo stream that runs along Colfax Avenue to Doty Road provided the parking lot is open. You can launch your boat and fish Potash Lake and also run down to the Pompton. Please note that there is a limit on horsepower so please check with the Oakland or Pompton Lakes police. Colfax Road is on the west shore of Potash Lake and runs from Skyline Drive to Pompton Lakes.

This year's stocking will once again be on Thursday mornings at 9:30 AM starting on April 17. We will once again use two boats to float stock above and below the Glen Gray bridge and we will also bucket stock the section across from Britts' Tackle Shop. If you would like to help at Britts' please be there at 9 AM. Ramapo Day will be on June 14 this

year. Please plan on helping out at this event. There will be over 100 kids at the event so we will have seven stations set up to teach them conservation, fly tying and casting, water testing, biological surveying of stream life, etc. To do this properly we need about 25 volunteers helping from 9 AM to about 2 PM.
