No More Clinches?

In the February 5, 2004 issue of The Fisherman (NJ and Delaware Bay edition) there is an enlightening article about knots by Pete Barrett. The author visited the Pure Fishing research facility in Spirit Lake, Iowa and found that one of his favorite knots (and mine), the improved clinch knot, was not as strong as the Trilene knot. The test strength of the line that was used in the tests was not given but the article states that the improved clinch knot gave out at 17 pounds while the Trilene knot stayed tied at 19 pounds when the line broke. That's only two pounds but it means that the Trilene knot survived under twelve percent greater strain and might have been ready to take more tension when the line snapped. Because the strength tests were run with the same batch of line and on the same testing machine, it doesn't appear that any bias effected the test results.

In addition to recommending the Trilene knot, the article also offers two other bits of advice. Moisten your knots with saliva before you draw them tight and try to use an implement such as pli-

ers to tighten the knot. Now that we know why we haven't been catching those big ones, we'll have to switch Improved Clinch Knot knots. I found the accompanying illustration of both the improved clinch







and the Trilene knots in my 1992 version of Fishing For Trout by Andy Gennaro.

Fish Ways Fly Reels

Reels for fly-fishing come in various configurations but are basically rather simple mechanisms, used to store the line. They have a rather wide range in price, varying from an entry-level \$29.95 to \$1,200 for a top of the line limited addition. Better made reels are machined from bar stock aluminum, a process which begins with a three to five pound block of aircraft grade metal from which the final three ounce product is produced. Obviously the quality goes up with the price tag but there are many good reels on today's market which will stand the test of time. (For example, as of this writing, Pflueger has reentered the marketplace with machined reels which are retailing for \$89.99 in any of the various sizes.) For extra spools, expect to pay approximately 50% of the cost of your particular reel.

The simpler versions have a one-to-one retrieve ratio and a drag controlled by a spring and pawl mechanism. Look for the reel to have an exposed rim so that you can palm it to slow down a big running fish.

Another variation on the theme is a large arbor spool, which will give the user a three-to-one retrieve. The trade-off here is that you will lose backing capacity.

Manufacturers attempt to remedy this by A) enlarging the diameter of the reel, or B) making the spool wider. (On a personal note, I find the wider spools somewhat clumsy when trying to get the line back on the spool in "the heat of battle" and hence prefer the larger diameter solution.) You can increase the backing capacity by cutting the last fifteen feet of fly line. This is simply level running line and will not effect the cast. For larger diameter reels and bigger fish situations, you might want to consider a model with a more aggressive drag. These are more appropriate for fighting long running species like albacore, bone fish or tarpon. Check to see if the drag is smooth at its lower settings as well as the upper end. I would also suggest that you find a reel with an enclosed drag as the saltwater environment is notorious for being destructive. One particle of sand can cause a disaster. Be sure that you rinse the reel after each session. This is easily accomplished by dipping the reel in fresh water and allowing it to dry, spool and housing separate. I would also suggest that you strip the line down to the backing and immerse it in fresh water, running it through a towel to dry before replacing it on the reel.

Ramapo Ramblin' 2003 Conservation Report

About 50 EJTU volunteers worked on various projects on the Ramapo last year. The projects included float stocking, clean ups, tree planting, BATS surveys, electro shocking, etc. It was a very active year with everyone working together to make it a success. Thank you! February was a month of meetings to plan activities for the year. Then activities began in March with EJTU members participating in an open house at Britt's Tackle Shop in Oakland. We presented a slide program featuring the activities of EJTU at the Girl Scout Jamboree in Kinnelon and also had some members demonstrating fly casting and fly tying. A clean up of the Glen Gray Road area was completed and wood chips were spread in the Glen Gray Road parking area. Preparations were made for the upcoming stocking season. We had a continual slide presentation of conservation activities at the Suffern Show. April found the members gearing up for the stocking season and assisting the state stocking program every week of the stocking season by doing a bucket stocking downstream from Britt's Tackle Shop and float stocking with two boats at the Glen Gray Bridge. One boat is taken upstream to the Baxter property to be launched, and the trout are transported up there in an aerated cooler. The other boat is launched at Glen Gray Bridge to stock downstream. There is also a team that meets the state's truck at Halifax Road and bucket stocks upstream. We estimate that over 4,000 trout are stocked over a two mile stretch of water.

Upper Delaware Trip

Using grant money, we did a tree planting at Bear Swamp Brook to support the banks at the upper sections. We are proposing that one and a third mile, of the Ramapo be made a conservation stretch. We attended a meeting at the Ramapo River Interstate Partnership in Suffern to discuss the plans of the Army Engineers to dredge both the Mahwah Brook and a section of the Ramapo above the college. Water temperature monitors were placed in the Ramapo. The first BATS survey was done.

Riffles

Ramapo River Day was at the top of the agenda for June. EJTU and Ramapo College presented a program that brought 120 middle school kids to Halifax Road to learn all aspects of conservation and to stock warm water fish in Henry Lake. Twenty-five EJTU members assisted. Plans are being made to possibly build a handicap deck at Henry Lake. We also assisted the Wayne Boy Scouts in stocking trout in the Singac Brook.

July was a quiet month. Rich Malizia attended a meeting to oppose the Ramsey plan to drill two wells in the reservation.

In August a second BATS survey was done. Then Bob Papson from the NJ Department of Fish and Wildlife had a team do electro-shocking on 1500 meters of stream below Glen Gray Bridge; this was a first step in checking the survival rate of trout in hot weather. Fourteen browns and a rainbow were found and the oxygen level and pH were found to be excellent. Papson will do more tests in 2004. EJTU members assisted with the testing.

In September a clean up was done, plans made for the state's fall stocking and we placed an order to purchase trout for our private stocking in November. Ed Sikorski reported that the six temperature

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monitors were removed from the Ramapo; the highest reading that was recorded was 78 degrees for a short period.

October found us once again assisting the state with its fall stocking program. As a finale for the year we used two boats to place 300 trout in the Glen Gray Bridge area of the Ramapo. One hundred conservation pamphlets that describe the importance of keeping the river clean were distributed to homeowners who live along the Ramapo. A final BATS survey that indicated that the Mayfly count was down from 2003 was done; this was possibly due to drought conditions in 2002.

Thank you to our conservation committee members, Rich Malizia, Tom Yuille, Ed Sikorski, Bruce Seiden, Bill Borowski, Larry Hill, George Petersen, John Roetman, Ray Cappock, John Grisoni, Rich Hudak, and to all the EJTU members who volunteered their time during the year.
