## **President's Beat**

At the November 18 Board of Directors' Meeting, Points Chairman Ken Vander Pyl reported that an additional 445 points had been earned and recorded for the month. This brings the total for the year 2004 to 13,660. Since each point represents four hours of volunteer work, East Jersey members have donated 3,415 hours of their time and efforts in our missions of conservation and education. On behalf of the Board of Directors I would like to thank each and every one of the members and congratulate you on this achievement.

Through your efforts we were able to run the fly tying schools in Clifton and Paramus and the mini tying and fly fishing courses at the Pequest Hatchery and the Introduction to Fly Fishing course in Paramus. All of these serve to get interested anglers started in the right direction. My special thanks go to Directors Doug Penna and Bob Ribar for coordinating these projects for the Chapter. Thanks are also due to Chairman Herman Drenth, and the Conservation Committee for all of their work in the past year. Getting crews to assist the State in the weekly stocking of trout as well as the clean ups, water quality and temperature monitoring and the special events (Ramapo Day, Meadowlands Festival, Verona Park Day) are tasks hard enough in their own right but these folks also make sure that the proper equipment is available, the gloves, bags, trash grabbers, float boxes, aerators, tables and whatever else is needed for the particular event.

Director Basil Santamaria did an outstanding job this year with merchandizing at our monthly meetings and at the various shows; e.g., The Outdoor Expo at Rockland Community College and the Annual Open House at the Hatch-(Continued on page 2) December 2004

#### Fish Ways - The ABC's of Fly-Fishing Random Thoughts on Basic Stream Etiquette

(Normally this space is used to give advice to the novice angler, however even veterans can use an occasional "brush up". Please let me know what I might have absentmindedly omitted.) Angling, especially angling with a fly rod, has been called "the gentle sport". Perhaps that is because we fish primarily on foot rather than from flashy, metallicflaked, high-powered boats. In addition, fly anglers rarely compete in any sort of tournament. We prefer to pit our knowledge and skills against the fish rather than the skills of other anglers. We are rare holdouts in an increasingly competitive society where professional athletes have forgotten the meanings of words such as "game" and "play". (E.g. consider the state of the National Basketbrawl Association.) First and foremost, fly anglers need room. We need room for a backcast as well as a forward cast. Always give another person sufficient room for both. If, when fishing a stream, you come upon someone else, be sure to allow ample space. Personally I make it a practice to leave the water and walk a good distance inland to reach a spot away from other anglers. Remember that many fish live under or near the banks. Don't disturb them. Fish the same water only when specifically invited. Should you encounter an angler sitting on the bank and watching (or perhaps contemplating the fate of the Universe) ask what his intentions are before entering the water. He might be resting a fish he has been stalking for the past hour.

Wade carefully, especially when fishing downstream. You will inadvertently disturb many fish by sloppy wading. Don't spoil the fishing for yourself and others.

Avoid loud noises. Ours is a tranquil sport, pursued in beautiful surroundings. Let's keep it that way. Don't yell to a friend or partner unless you are truly sure that only those in your party are nearby. If you must use a cell phone or walkietalkie, leave the water and duck behind a tree to "answer the call". Don't openly admit you are connected to an electronic leash.

Etiquette does not carry the weight of law but rather the rules for behavior in a civilized society. Let's protect the future of our sport by conducting ourselves properly.

(N.B. New Jersey law states that the license holder is solely responsible for knowing whose property he is using; the individual landowner need not "post" his boundaries. When fishing public waters, be aware of the borders. When fishing private lands, obtain permission first. Even if refused, be polite. At that moment you are an angler and an ambassador ad hoc for our sport. Contrary to popular belief, we do not have a God-given, constitutionally guaranteed right to fish where and when we choose. Fishing is a privilege; let's not abuse it.)

## **Annual Super Bowl Connetquot Trip**

Our next chapter trip to the Connetquot River will be on Sunday, January 30, 2005. This is our annual Super Bowl trip and is open to 32 Trout Unlimited members in good standing.

Karen Canning will take reservations at the December and January membership meetings. She will be at the door where you first enter.

You must be a Trout Unlimited member and have a valid Trout Unlimited membership card, which you must present along with full payment at the time you register. There will be no refunds for no-shows because we have to pay for a full day of fishing. The cost for the day of fishing is \$45.00. You must have a 2005 New York State fishing license.

Please keep in mind that fishing starts at 8:00 AM, not earlier. You may arrive at the park anytime after 7:00 AM to get ready, but you may not fish until 8:00 o'clock. On our last trip we had people fishing well before the 8 o'clock starting time and this does not go well with the park personnel.

It's our privilege to be able to fish the Connetquot, so I would hate to lose our chance to fish it in the future because of a few people who try to be first to get to a beat that they want to fish. PLEASE FOLLOW THE RULES.

#### **Ramapo Ramblin'**

It seems like yesterday that we were stocking trout for the first time this year, making plans for Ramapo Day, preparing to run a booth at the Meadowlands fair and do BATS surveys, planting shrubs at Bear Swamp Brook, placing monitors in the river, etc. All in all a busy year for everyone. As Chairman of the Conservation Committee, I wish to thank our committee members who worked diligently to improve the Ramapo River and its tributaries. Through their work we opened one third of a mile of river north of the Glen Gray Bridge. This added another stocking stop for the state and also added more trout for that stretch. Contrary to what some fishermen may think, no trout were taken from the lower area to stock the upper section, but rather more trout were added!

At this time I have no confirmation concerning the stocking at the Cleveland Bridge at Bear Swamp Road for next year, however it appears that the state will no longer stock at that area due to a lack of parking. In order for the state to stock, there must be public access to the river.

Last month I wrote that it only takes one mercury thermometer to pollute a twenty acre lake. I failed to tell you that you can go to the Bergen Health Center (327 East Ridgewood Avenue, Paramus across from Bergen Pines hospital) to trade in your Mercury thermometers for other types without mercury. I sometimes receive hunting information that I cannot send out via Email to everyone because some do not want it. Therefore I have set up a hunting Email address list so I can send hunting information to hunters only. water belongs to the first fisherman fishing it. It is inconsiderate to crowd an angler and just how close an approach is permissible is obviously variable. The river has fish in every part of it, so there is no need to crowd out other fishermen. Personally, I have caught more fish when I fished between the beats.

I've fished the Connetquot for many years and found that the best way to fish it is to catch a couple of fish in one spot and then move on to the next. This gives everybody a chance to fish the whole stream. So lets follow the rules, use our manners and enjoy a great day of fishing.
