Rainbow, Brown and Brook Trout

The brook trout is native to northeastern North America from Georgia to the Arctic Circle and it is the only salmonid (trout) species native to New Jersey and designated the state fish. It requires the coldest water temperatures of these trout species. It's tolerance to both acid and alkaline waters is also greater. In rivers having a mixed-trout population the brookie is most often found in the headwater section and around cold tributary streams. There are approximately 123 streams containing naturally reproducing brook trout populations in New Jersey.

The brown trout is native to Europe and has been widely introduced in North America beginning in 1883. It is slightly less tolerant of warm water than the rainbow trout but appears to be more tolerant of habitat degradation and change. It normally occupies the downstream section of streams with mixed-trout populations. There are approximately 79 streams containing naturally reproducing brown trout populations in New Jersey. The brown trout generally grows larger than the rainbow or brookie reaching upwards of 40 pounds.

The rainbow trout is native to the North American Pacific drainage from Northwestern Mexico to Kushowin River in Alaska. This popular gamefish has been widely introduced throughout the world. The migrating rainbow, whether anadromous or lake type, is known as a steelhead. The number of naturally reproducing populations within the state are minimal with only 18 streams documented.

In addition to naturally occurring trout populations, the Division of Fish and Wildlife distributes over 770,000 brook, brown and rainbow trout into over 200 waterbodies across the state, each year.

Operation Game Thief

What do you do if you're fishing, hunting or just walking in the woods and you see someone violating game laws? You probably feel that something should be done but because of the natural



law violations and maybe even earn a reward of up to \$200. It is Operation Game Thief, a program sponsored by the NJ Federation of Sportsmen's Clubs in cooperation with the Division of Fish and Wildlife.

If you see or are aware of a violation, call the toll-free number 1-800-222-0456 (the number can be called 24 hours a day, seven days a week) and give as much information as possible. By reporting violations as promptly as possible and being as specific as you can the chances for apprehending violators are better.

2007 Trout fishing Regulations

We in EJTU usually assume that all members know the trout fishing regulations. But now and then when a question arises you see experienced anglers get a far away look in their eyes as they try to remember the rules so here's a quick refresher course in the 2007 trout fishing regulations. This is a summary of the full regulations that are posted on the NJ Fish and Wildlife web site, and while most of us practice catch and release the creel limits are included for those who want to have a little fish-fry.

General Regulations for Brook, Brown and Rainbow Trout

January 1 — March 18 - minimum size 7 inches, daily creel limit 4

March 19 — April 7 at 8 AM – Fishing prohibited on all waters listed for trout stocking; all other waters, catch and

release only (there are some exceptions; e.g., boundary waters such as Greenwood Lake).

Waters with in-season stocking closures are closed to fishing 5 AM to 5 PM on days listed for stocking. There are special regulation areas (wild trout streams, year round and seasonal trout conservation areas, trophy and holdover trout lakes).

April 7 at 8 AM — May 31 - minimum size 7 inches; daily creel limit 6

June 1 — Dec. 31 – minimum size 7 inches; daily creel limit 4

Local Trout Stocked Waters Closed to Fishing (5 a.m. to 5 p.m.) on Spring Stocking Dates

There are quite a few rivers, streams, ponds and lakes that are stocked with trout in Spring but the Ramapo and the Wanaque rivers are probably the nearest

to most EJTU members, so their stocking dates are the only ones given here. The general trout regulations listed above apply. In addition, stocked waters including all tributaries, for a distance of 100 ft. from the main channel are closed to fishing from 5 AM to 5 PM on dates listed for stocking. There are no closures for fall stocking.

Ramapo River — State line to Pompton Lake (excluding Potash Lake)
THURSDAYS - April 12, 19, 26, May 3, 10, 17, 24.

Wanaque River — Greenwood Lake dam to junction with Pequannock River, excluding Wanaque Reservoir, Monksville Reservoir

FRIDAYS - April 13, 20, 27, May 4, 11, 18, 25

Conservation Notes

Now that Herm Drenth is becoming a High Muck-A-Muck, or I should say a Pooh Bah since Muck-A-Mucks are often arrogant and Herm never is, here I am trailing in his wake and trying to figure out what to write in this column that was always his. I suppose the easiest way is to let you know what the EJTU Conservation Committee has scheduled for the next few months, so if this column reads like someone's Day-Timer you will have to excuse me.

By the time you read this the Suffern Show will be over but, this is the event that seems to wake us up and force us out of our houses after those long, dark winter days during which we read catalogs and dream about trees with leaves on them. It also gives EJTU a chance to tell a lot of people what we've done for conservation in the past year, it provides an opportunity for us generate some new members, and we can also sell some flies and raffle tickets. Somehow Basil Santamaria quietly plans and manages the whole four-day event without breaking a sweat. Nice work, Basil!

Three weeks after the Suffern Show we will begin our outdoors activities – a cleanup along the Ramapo that is scheduled for Saturday, March 24. Even a relatively mild winter can cause a surprising mess along the Ramapo, so Rich Malizia will have Mahwah drop off a new supply of wood chips for the parking area on the east side of Glen Gray bridge, and John Grisoni is asking Oakland to

supply gravel for the area just west of the bridge. This, of course, means that our hardy volunteers should bring shovels and rakes to level all this material.

For the actual cleanup there will be a supply of garbage bags on hand to bundle up the paper, plastic and other debris that was deposited along the banks during the winter. We will meet at Glen Gray bridge at 9 AM and if there are enough people we should also be able to tidy up the area on the Ramapo around Halifax Road.

In a few weeks Ed Sikorski will once again put temperature recorders into various locations on the Ramapo, and this year he will also put a recorder into the Wanaque River. Ed retrieves the recorders in the fall and then copies the data onto a computer, so we have a permanent record of river temperatures.

On Saturday, March 31 and Sunday, April 1 EJTU will be at the Pequest Hatchery for the annual Open House. This event draws many people – the word hordes comes to mind – because there are attractions for all ages. If you can spare some time contact Bob Hresko and let him know that you can give him a hand.

Trout season opens on Saturday, April 7 so we will assist the State in their Ramapo stocking program on the seven Thursdays that follow opening day - April 12, 19, 26, May 3, 10, 17, 24. Bruce Seiden has once again let us use his boat for float stocking and the cooler has been cleaned and is ready so all we need are coffee to start the days and some fish to put into the river. Volunteers – the more the

merrier – will assemble at Glen Gray bridge to tell lies about the days when fishing was really good at 9 AM each Thursday. Then the Fish & Wildlife truck will arrive at around 10 AM; by 12:30 we can put the boat away, clean the cooler and everyone can go home.

Looking ahead to early June, we have two events that need volunteers. Saturday, June 2 is the date for this year's Ramapo Day. Rich Malizia, who coordinates this whole event, will have more details in coming months but we know that sheparding the children around, demonstrating a BATS, tying flies, and teaching casting will require a number of people.

One week later, on Saturday, June 9, the Meadowlands Festival takes place in the park in Secaucus that is located next to the Hackensack River behind Snake Hill. There are no details yet but, once again Rich Malizia will coordinate EJTU's activities at the affair.

If you want to plan really far ahead, save some time on Saturday, July 14 and Sunday, July 15. The Appalachian Trail Conservancy will hold its bi-annual convention at Ramapo College on those days and EJTU has been invited to give short presentations. Rich Malizia will have more details as the event gets closer.

Well, as Herm Drenth always ended his column, "Don't drink the water downstream from the buffalo herd". That doesn't sound right, does it?. I'll have to give Herm a call.

No one, not even the person you speak with on the phone needs to know your identity. If you desire to remain anonymous you will be assigned a code number of your own choosing. You will be told when to call back to find out the result of your tip, and if your information leads to the issuance of a citation, you are eligible for a reward. Reward payments can be made in untraceable bank money orders or in cash and delivered to you as per your instructions. You are fully protected.

The person who commits wildlife crime for whatever reason is a crook, a thief and a cheat who robs us all of not only our precious wildlife, but also our tax and license dollars. Don't make excuses for wildlife crime and don't tolerate poaching or other illegal activities among your

hunting, fishing, or hiking companions. Report violations and help conserve our wildlife for others to enjoy while at the same time helping yourself.
