President's Beat

I don't want to make this column a monthly weather report but I have to say that it is nice to see the days growing longer, even though the added sunlight is shining on piles of snow. And as our period of hibernation tapers down it is time to once again think about Trout Unlimited's mission: to conserve, protect and restore North America's coldwater fisheries and their watersheds.

It goes without saying that EJTU members aren't expected to carry out conservation duties all across North America. You are not expected to jet out to Minnesota and perform a citizen's arrest on a farmer who left a dead cow near a stream, and then rush off to picket a strip mine. But, we should try to think more about what we do and should not do during our everyday activities. Especially, as the longer days and warmer temperatures allow us to once again head for streams, ponds and open country.

I mentioned strip mines and bovine carcasses as potential polluters but most of us have for years had pieces of fishing gear that are now considered to be dangerous to streams and to trout – felt bottomed wading boots. Those slip-resistant felt soles along with the absorbent laces and all of the nooks and crannies on the boots can easily carry Didymosphenia geminata, commonly known as rock-snot or didymo. Moreover, in addition to carrying the didymo alga that can fill streams with a cotton-like growth that makes streams impossible to fish, old style boots can also spread whirling disease.

If the last paragraph leaves you thinking that you will have to revert to barefoot fishing, don't worry because the equipment manufacturers are one step ahead of you. They have designed and are selling boots with "sticky rubber" soles that have the same gripping capability as your old felt soles. Sticky rubber soles have been avail-

able for some time now but, since felt has been found to cause problems, manufacturers are coming out with more styles. LL. Bean, for instance, now carries a Riverkeeper rubber-soled boot in both studded and non-studded styles, Simms has a number of boots with 'Streamtread' soles, and Patagonia is supposed to be coming out with a wading sandal that has a Vibram "Idogrip" sole. The sticky rubber soles and non-absorbent qualities of these boots are supposed to eliminate the alga and disease problems that have been caused by traditional felt soles but they will also make your life easier in other ways. Felt soles absorb quite a bit of water and add weight while rubber does not and, if you are a winter fisherman, you don't have to fight a ball of snow and ice that clings to the felt because the rubber sole sheds it.

The studded soles come at a higher price tag but, a Maine fishing blog has photos of a writer's boots that he studded with 6x3/8" sheet metal screws.

If you are like me and you don't like to buy footwear without trying it on, why not go to Ramsey Outdoor Store? They have the Simms Riversheds with aquastealth soles in the store and will soon have vibram soled boots. But first go to the Ramsey Outdoor web site and sign up for their monthly discount certificates; they will give you a healthy price reduction on whatever you buy.

Dunkerhook Clean-up

At 10 AM on Sunday, March 1 EJTU will revisit an area that we once visited regularly – the Saddle River.

Rich Malizia tells us that, near the confluence of Saddle River and HoHoKus Brook, litter collects on the east side of the brook just below the falls as a result of high water going over the wing of the dam. Therefore, we will meet by the Dunkerhook parking area (access from Paramus Road) and remove the trash from the area upstream from the parking area. Please bring waders or hip boots to the clean-up because several of the places will have to be cleaned from the water.

Rich also says that the area above the dam has a number of large carp in the 3 to 5 pound range. Trout are stocked in season and there are also bass and sunfish. While most of the fish are small there are a few impressive fish. Furthermore, downstream from the dam the river winds away from the main path, gets far less fishing pressure and has some interesting water. This might be a good chance for you to look over a new fishing area while also tidying up a place in need of some help.
