Monofilament Recycling

Issue 3

Our monofilament recycling program has been quiet during the winter months but as the days lengthen and more people come out to fish our volunteers will soon be active again.

If you are not familiar with our program here is a brief explanation. We have mounted monofilament recycling bins in a number of north Jersey locations that are near fishing areas. The bins - two and a half foot, vertical pieces of five inch PVC pipe with a ninety degree ell on top, into which discarded mono can be placed, and a cap at the bottom – are now at Glen Gray Road and Halifax Road on the Ramapo River, near East Shore Road on the Wanague River, at two locations on Point View Reservoir, next to the boat ramp on Green Turtle Pond, next to two of Monksville Reservoir's boat ramps, and at the boat ramps servicing the four reservoirs (Canistear, Clinton, Echo Lake, and Oak Ridge) managed by the Newark Watershed Commission. The bins at the Newark Watershed's reservoirs are checked and emptied by an employee of the Commission but all of the others are the responsibility of EJTU member volunteers.

The monofilament that is retrieved from the bins is put into boxes with pre-paid

and silent auctions plus a nice dinner with equally nice people.

Possibly in the last week of March and definitely during the weeks after the April 11 opening day of trout season we will meet the truck that carries trout to the streams in north Jersey. At the now-closed Britt's Tackle location and at Halifax Road on the Ramapo we distribute buckets of trout up and down stream; at Glen Gray Road we do the same but from a boat heading downstream and via cooler on a truck upstream. Every week the trout stocking is preceded by coffee, chatting and fish stories.

On Saturday, March 28 we will assemble at Glen Gray Road, next to the Ramapo River, clean up any trash, and rake wood chips over the area where fishermen park. It's similar to the Dunkerhook clean-up with coffee, unlimited chatting, and working with diligent but friendly people but, on this day we will also plant willow shoots along the Ramapo's banks.

On Saturday/Sunday, April 4/5 we will be at the Pequest Trout Hatchery. Inside the hall we will tie flies, hand out information and talk to the many visitors. Outside, at the trout pond, we will assist children who fish the pond (help bait hooks, unhook fish, etc.) Another fun day, rain or shine, at an event that has attracted thousands of visitors.

Another Saturday, this one on April 25, and EJTU will be represented at the Hudson River Fishermen's "Hooked On The Hudson". Tying flies, telling people about TU, and some very rudimentary fly casting instruction keep us busy at Ross Dock – in the shadow of the GW Bridge.

As you can see, anyone can be a big help at any of the EJTU events. There is no need for special talent or training; all you need is a desire to help and to meet friendly people. If you, like me, tie flies that look worse than road-kill you don't have to volunteer to tie; attend the event, pitch in where you can, and have fun.

Here Come the Bugs

If you have a clear view of the sky near tree tops and you lie back in a chaise lounge at around the time of the evening twilight you will probably see strange birds silhouetted against the darkening sky. They don't appear to be going from one tree to the next as birds do, and their flight patterns are not the steady, rhythmic patterns of birds. Instead, they circle, dart, dive and flit around in what seems to be an aimless and nervous circus act. As you try to determine why these evening birds display such erratic behavior, try to remember the time of day; you are not watching martins or swallows feeding before heading to roost but bats that are beginning their nightly sky-dance in search of flying insects. I have watched this early evening display of acrobatics many times from my patio but this year I am afraid that it may be missing from my neighborhood. And, since the bats may be missing, the bugs that they would have fed on will flourish because every night each of these aerial insectivores would have consumed 50 to 75 percent of its weight in insects.

As the bats disappear from the sky, scientists are not blaming humans for the disappearance of a wildlife form as they are sometimes prone to do, but are instead admitting that they don't know what is to

Check Your Outboard Gas

Spring will be here soon so boats are coming out of back yards and outboard motors are being prepared for use. But everything is not the same as it always has been; most gas now has ethanol added to it.

On page 26 of the March 2009 issue of <u>Outdoor Life</u> there is an article about ethanol that will interest outboard motor users. The article describes how the ethanol that is mixed in gas easily separates and can cause problems in outboards if precautions are not taken. At one point in the article ethanol is described as "a varnish that dissolves any gunk in the tank, including rust caused by condensation. Ethanol even dissolves fiberglass tanks...".

I have not looked into all of <u>Outdoor Life's</u> claims but anyone who depends on an outboard motor should take the time to look for information on ethanol's effects and to look for a good fuel stabilizer.

Now, if the five hundred thirty five experts in Washington, DC would throw out their ethanol requirements and let people use corn for its proper purpose – bourbon – we would all be happier.

blame. They see what is happening but they don't know the cause or how it is spread.

What is happening is that large numbers of hibernating bats are dying. Those that have been examined have been emaciated, lacking in body fat, and in generally poor condition. The outward sign of the illness, a white fungus growing on their muzzles and other body parts, gives the malady its name - White-Nose Syndrome. White-Nose Syndrome was first noted among dead and hibernating bats in caves near Albany, New York in 2007. Since then tens of thousands of dead and dying bats have been found in New York, Vermont, Massachusetts, and Connecticut. And now the Northeast Region of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service reports that the syndrome has surfaced in both New Jersey and Pennsylvania.

It is well known that many people regard bats in much the same way that they regard snakes, i.e., with strong aversion. The aversion to snakes may originate from teachings about the Garden of Eden and the dread of bats might have originated with Bram Stoker's Dracula but no one is being urged to fondle these creatures. However, as with the raptors – that we admire - we should try to protect them so they can go about their business of keeping *(Continued on page 4)*
